LOS ANGELES LEAGUE OF CONSERVATION VOTERS ENDORSES ANJA REINKE FOR BURBANK CITY COUNCIL

LOS ANGELES, Calif. – The Los Angeles League of Conservation Voters, the county-wide political action organization dedicated to supporting candidates and ballot measures that protect the environment, today announced their endorsement of Anja Reinke for Burbank City Council.

Two seats are open on the Burbank council with no incumbents in the race. A leading candidate for one seat is Anja Reinke, a 28-year resident of the City of Burbank and a practicing family law attorney in the city. She presently serves on the Burbank police commission and her candidacy is supported by current council members Marsha Ramos and Todd Campbell – two strong supporters of the environment.

“I am proud to receive the League’s endorsement. The environment is a prime concern of Burbank residents. How to protect the health and safety of our residents and help conserve our natural resources while balancing growth in our city will no doubt be daunting challenges to any council member. The difference is that I am willing to listen, learn, and deal with the issues proactively,” Reinke remarked.

“Anja Reinke is a go-getter. She convinced us of her sincere interest in the environment and her willingness to take pro-environment positions on issues that come before the Burbank City Council. We will look to her leadership on environmental issues,” Mitchell Schwartz, LALCV president, stated.

Schwartz is confident Anja Reinke’s environmental approach will be a refreshing and much-needed contribution to the communities in Burbank that are facing huge developments, traffic and congestion, noise and air pollution, and the airport expansion. Reinke’s experience as an advocate for low-income families, victims of domestic abuse, and public health and safety as well as her other civic involvement will serve her well in City Council.

In its 22-year history, the Los Angeles League of Conservation Voters has helped to elect more than 100 environmental leaders to local offices in Los Angeles County.
